The readings from the weekday cycle generally are to be used even on days on which a Memorial or Optional Memorial of a Saint occurs. The exceptions to this rule are the Memorials or Optional Memorials which have “proper readings” (usually only the Gospel) assigned to them in the *Lectionary for Mass* and which must be used on those days. Substitutions from the Commons or Proper of Saints may be made for the other readings suggested for those Memorials or Optional Memorials. The Priest Celebrant, however, should not omit “too often or without sufficient cause the readings assigned for each day in the weekday Lectionary” (Introduction to the *Lectionary for Mass*, no. 83).

 US Holidays and National Days of Remembrance or Action are in blue.

Notes for the Year of Grace 2019

1. The 2019 Liturgical Year begins on the First Sunday of Advent, December 1, 2018.
2. Outside Advent, Christmas Time, Lent, and Easter Time, on Saturdays which have no commemoration having the rank of Obligatory Memorial or higher, a Mass in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary may be celebrated. The readings and prayers may be selected from the *Collection of Masses of the Blessed Virgin Mary, reprinted in 2012* with approved adaptations to conform to *The Roman Missal, Third Edition (2011)*
3. Since the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is celebrated on June 28, 2019, the Memorial of Saint Irenaeus, Bishop and Martyr, is omitted this year.
4. Since the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles, is celebrated on June 29, 2019, the Memorial of the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary is omitted this year.
5. As noted in the table of Principal Celebrations, in the Dioceses of Salt Lake City, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord (May 30, 2019) has been transferred to the following Sunday (June 2, 2019) and replaces the Seventh Sunday of Easter.
6. The Anniversary of the Dedication of a Parish Church is a proper solemnity for the parish. See *Appendix II on page 26* for a listing of dedication dates.
7. The Anniversary of the Rededication of the Cathedral Church of the Madeleine, February 21, is celebrated as a solemnity in the cathedral church and as a feast throughout the diocese.
8. Ritual Masses – Ritual Masses are connected to the celebration of Sacraments or Sacramentals. They may not be celebrated on the Sundays of Advent, Lent, and Easter, on solemnities, on the days within the Octave of Easter, on All Souls Day (Commemoration of the Faithful Departed), on Ash Wednesday, and during Holy Week and furthermore due

regard is to be had for the norms set out in the ritual books or in the Masses themselves (GIRM-General Instruction of the Roman Missal 372).

❖ Order of Celebrating Matrimony

- The *Order of Celebrating Matrimony*, English translation of the 2nd typical edition, for use in the dioceses of the United States (published 2016) is the ritual text to be used. No other English edition of the *Order of Celebrating Matrimony* may be used in the dioceses of the United States of America. [Decree of Publication, February 2, 2016]
- Whenever Marriage is celebrated within Mass, the Ritual Mass “The Celebration of Marriage” is used with sacred vestments of the color white or of a festive color. On those days listed in nos. 1 – 4 of the Table of Liturgical Days (see Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year, 59), however, the Mass of the day is used with its own readings, with inclusion of the Nuptial Blessing and, if appropriate, the proper formula for the final blessing.
- If, however, during Christmas and Ordinary Time, the parish community participates in a Sunday Mass during which Marriage is celebrated, the Mass of the Sunday is used.
- Nevertheless, since a Liturgy of the Word adapted for the celebration of Marriage has a great impact in the handing on of catechesis about the Sacrament itself and about the duties of the spouses, when the Mass “For the Celebration of Marriage” is not said, one of the readings may be taken from the texts provided for the celebration of Marriage (nos. 144-187) (*The Order of Celebrating Matrimony*, 34).
- If a Marriage is celebrated on a day having a penitential character, especially during Lent, the pastor is to counsel the spouses to take into account the special nature of that day. The celebration of marriage on Friday of the Passion of the Lord and Holy Saturday is to be avoided all together (*The Order of Celebrating Matrimony*, 32).

- ❖ Funeral Masses—Funeral Masses are not permitted on solemnities that are holydays of obligation, Holy Thursday, the Easter Triduum, and the Sundays of Advent, Lent, and Easter (GIRM 380). In such cases where the Funeral Mass is not permitted the Funeral Liturgy outside of Mass may be used (see *Order of Christian Funerals*, 178).

See Appendix I on page 23 for a table of principal liturgical celebrations throughout the liturgical year indicating when a Funeral Mass, Funeral Outside of Mass, Wedding Ritual Mass, or Wedding Outside of Mass is permitted.

(Holy Week begins)
- Blessing and Distribution of Palms – Three forms are offered for the beginning of the liturgy on this day: the procession, the solemn entrance, and the simple entrance. Masses beginning with either the solemn entrance or the procession omit the Act of Penitence. The Sign of the Cross and Greeting begin the celebration of the Liturgy. While the text of the Gospel for the Procession is included in the Missal, the Book of Gospels should be used. The invitation to the Procession “Let us go forth in peace” has a proper response “In the name of Christ, Amen.” The Passion proclaimed on this day is essential to the liturgy and cannot be omitted. It may be proclaimed (either read or chanted) using multiple readers. Lay persons are allowed to do any of the parts. A solemn blessing for the Passion of the Lord is also found in the blessings provided at the end of the “Order of Mass.” This blessing may also be used on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week.*
- April 14 National Collection for the Holy Land (Palm Sunday and/or Good Friday)

Sacred Paschal Triduum

(Late afternoon April 18, 2019 – Evening Prayer, April 21, 2018)

Thursday – Sunday, April 18 – April 21: Ritual Masses are not permitted; a funeral Mass is not permitted, the sacraments are not celebrated except penance, anointing of the sick and sacrament of initiation within the Masses of Easter; Holy Communion may be brought to the sick during the Triduum except on Holy Saturday – on Holy Saturday Holy Communion may be given only as viaticum. Since the only Mass allowed on Holy Thursday is the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, it might be beneficial to celebrate Morning Prayer from the Liturgy of the Hours at the regularly scheduled time for morning Mass.

April

- 18 Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday)** white
The Mass of the Lord's Supper is not to begin before 4:00 pm. Lent ends before Evening Prayer is celebrated. The Easter triduum begins with the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper. Evening prayer on Holy Thursday is celebrated only by those participating in the evening Mass. The Mass of the Lord's Supper is the principal Liturgy of the day and the only Mass to be celebrated.
- 19 Friday of the Passion of the Lord (Good Friday)** red
The Liturgy of the Hours, particularly Morning Prayer, is strongly encouraged to be celebrated with the community. The celebration of the Lord's Passion, the principal celebration of this day, should take place about 3:00 pm. If pastoral need dictates, there may be another celebration later in the day, particularly if it is necessary to repeat in a different language.
- 20 The Easter Vigil (Holy Saturday)** white
The Liturgy of the Hours, particularly Morning Prayer, is strongly encouraged to be celebrated with the community. The Easter Vigil is not to be scheduled before 8:30 pm. If there is a pastoral need to start earlier, please contact Msgr. Bircumshaw, Vicar General at the Diocese.
- 21 Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord** white
The fifty days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in joyful exultation as one feast day, or better, as one "great Sunday." The first eight days of the Easter Season make up the Octave of Easter and are celebrated as Solemnities of the Lord (CB. 371, 373). The Easter Sequence is to be sung on Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord (GIRM #64). On Easter Sunday, the tradition in the U.S. has been to replace the Creed with the Renewal of Baptismal Promises, followed by sprinkling with blessed water. The text may be found in the Roman Missal texts for the Easter Vigil.

Season of Easter
(April 22, 2019 – June 10, 2019)

Ritual Masses are not permitted; however, marriage may be celebrated within the Mass of the day, one reading from the ritual may be substituted, and the nuptial blessing is used a funeral Mass is permitted on Monday through Saturday only.

28 Sunday **Second Sunday of Easter** (*Divine Mercy Sunday*) white
A Rite of Sprinkling may appropriately replace the Penitential Act at the beginning of Mass on all Sundays during the Easter Season. At the conclusion of the sprinkling rite the Priest says “May almighty God cleanse us of our sins, and through the celebration of this Eucharist make us worthy to share at the table of his Kingdom. Amen.” (Roman Missal, App. II). The Gloria follows and should not be combined with or sung during the sprinkling rite as they are two distinct parts of the Introductory Rites.

The last Mass celebrated in Holy Rosary Church was in 1958 when the parish seat was moved to Copperton. It appears that moving the parish seat to a new church site did not always include a dedication.

12. Optional memorials; celebrated, in the special manner described in the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* and of the Liturgy of the Hours, even on the days listed in no. 9
13. In the same manner, Obligatory Memorials may be celebrated as Optional Memorials if they happen to fall on the Lenten weekdays.
14. Weekdays of Advent up to December 16 inclusive.
- Weekdays of the Christmas season from January 2 until the Sunday after Epiphany
 - Weekdays of the Easter season from Monday after the Octave of Easter until the Saturday before Pentecost inclusive.
 - Weekdays in Ordinary Time

LITURGICAL DEFINITIONS

Solemnity - the highest-ranking feast. These commemorate an event in the life of Jesus, Mary or the Apostles central to the Christian faith. The celebration of Mass on a Solemnity includes proper readings, the singing of the Gloria and the recitation of the creed.

Feast - the rank of secondary liturgical days including lesser events in the life of Jesus, Mary or an Apostle (theologically speaking) or for major saints.

Memorial - the commemoration of a saint of lesser importance. Many memorials are optional or only observed in specific dioceses, regions or nations.

Seasonal Weekday - a weekday in a "strong" liturgical season (Advent, Christmas Season, Lent, and Easter Season) on which no solemnity, feast, or memorial is observed.

Holy days of obligation - days on which, as canon 1247 of the Code of Canon Law states: "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass."

Abrogated - dispensed from the obligation, i.e. holy day of obligation is abrogated.

Liturgical Vestments: The Church's liturgical norms prescribe specific vestment colors for various celebrations for two purposes. First, the colors highlight the particular liturgical season and the journey through these seasons. Second, the colors punctuate the liturgical season by highlighting a particular event or particular mystery of faith.

White

- Season of Christmas
- Season of Easter
- Feasts of the Lord, other than of His passion
- Feasts of Mary, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs
- All Saints (1 November)
- Feasts of the Apostles
- Nuptial Masses
- Masses for the dead (Requiem Masses) when the deceased is a baptized child who died before the age of reason

Note: White is the color of Popes' non-liturgical dress. White can be replaced by silver.

Red

- Feasts of the Lord's Passion, Blood, and Cross
- Feasts of the Martyrs
- Palm Sunday
- Pentecost

Note: Red is the color of Cardinals' non-liturgical dress.

Green

- Time after Epiphany
- Time after Pentecost

Violet

- Season of Advent
- Season of Septuagesima
- Season of Lent
- Rogation Days
- Ember Days (except for Pentecost Ember Days)
- Vigils (except for Ascension and Pentecost)
- Good Friday

Note: Violet, literally "amaranth red," is the color of Bishops', Archbishops', and Patriarchs' non-liturgical dress.

Black

- All Souls' Day
- Masses for the dead (Requiem Masses), except for baptized children who have died before the age of reason

Gold

- Gold can replace white, red, or green (but not violet or black)

Rose

- Gaudete Sunday (Third Sunday of Advent)
- Laetare Sunday (Fourth Sunday of Lent)
